Seeking Prosperity Overseas

Working overseas as an Indonesian Migrant Worker in a more developed country where wages are higher is often seen as a quick solution for overcoming economic difficulties. Who could refuse a paycheck for millions of rupiah every month?

Money like that is a lot more than they could earn selling vegetables, farming or raising livestock in their hometowns.

Another reason people chose to work overseas is to improve their family's social status. The income earned as a migrant worker goes a long way to improving the wellbeing of the family at home. They can now afford to pay for the clothes, food and shelter they need. But the improved welfare that results from working overseas is not without costs. The children and spouses who are left at home are also affected.



Frequent Complaints

Things are also not easy overseas. Besides being far away from their families, they also often suffer stress. To date, migrants frequently face problems and legal issues, such as non-payment of their salaries.

What happens in the home is another story. Nothing is ever the same after a mother or father goes abroad to work. For the spouses of migrant workers, togetherness becomes a distant dream and being separated for long periods of time can be a trial. They are deprived of a companion and partner to confide in. For the children, they are denied the warmth of a normal family life in which to grow and develop.

From January to September 2019, the Blitar Religious Court handled 3,255 matrimonial cases. Sadly, these cases were dominated by Indonesian migrant workers, who accounted for 80 percent of all cases, while the remaining 20 percent involved civil servants and private-sector employees.

The Sad Story of Children Left at Home

Rizky has to bear the sadness of being left behind by his mother, who went to work in Hong Kong when he was just two. For four years, he spent his early childhood deprived of the warmth and affection of a mother, with the closest he got to her being the mobile-phone screen. Even though his grandmother and father were at home to look after him, nothing can replace a mother's love. Rizky's story is just one of many thousands involving children who end up being separated from their mothers when they go overseas to work.

After having saved up enough money, Rubaeti was determined to return to Indonesia to realize her dream, together with her family. Being forced to quit school did not make Rubaeti give up hope. Indeed, it was this that motivated her to work even harder - so that her children could get the education she had been denied. She left for Hong Kong when her first son was just 2.5 years old so as to earn money for his schooling. After meeting with Mandiri Sahabatku, Rubaeti was inspired to use the money she had saved from working as capital to start a business at home so that she would no longer need to work overseas.

Upon her return to Indonesia, she used her savings to develop the catfish farm that had been started previously by her husband. Although she suffered a setback when one catfish harvest failed, she did not give up. She learned from this failure and made the necessary changes. Armed with the knowledge she received during training, Rubaeti's business eventually expanded to encompass 16 catfish ponds. Not content with their success in the catfish business, Rubaeti and her husband now also have a goat farm. Using the land around her home, Rubaeti's has achieved her dream. Now there is no need for her to travel far away from her family to earn money.

In 2018, Kartini was selected as one of the participants in the Bapak/Ibu Asuh Keripik Shinta program in Lampung. It turned out that this was what paved the way for Kartini to become an entrepreneur in her own country. The business she started at home, called Aneka Keripik Kartini, has allowed her modest dream to come true: running her own business while helping Rizky with his homework every evening. Now, Rizky no longer feels sad seeing his classmates being picked up by their mothers after school.

With the skills and knowledge Sriati learned from Mandiri Sahabatku, she was confident that she could become a success by opening her own beauty salon business in her hometown. orking as a migrant in Hong Kong did nothing to reduce Sriati's determination to learn all about the salon business. She attended various training courses using her own money. Her employer was her first "customer" – the first person she practiced her skills on. Although the haircut she gave him left a lot to be desired, her employer was not angry and instead supported Sriati to keep improving her skills. Sriati then went to Hong Kong to earn money for her children's schooling. Even though Sriati and her husband never enjoyed a high level of education, they were the happiest parents in the world when their three children successfully gained admission to Brawijaya University in Malang. Sriati then returned to Indonesia when her son graduated from college.

Now, Sriati is reunited with her children and husband. The fact that she runs her "Sherly" salon business from her living room means that she is always together with her family. Now, the giggles and laughter of her little granddaughter make the family home even more convivial than ever. Thanks to her beauty salon business, Sriati can earn good money without having to travel far from her family.
